
Women in Africa have the highest risk of dying in pregnancy and childbirth in the world – and the lowest proportion of births attended by skilled health workers.

In some countries the risk is as high as 1 in 14 across her lifetime; she is more likely to die in childbirth than to go to secondary school. The risk is


RISKING DEATH TO GIVE BIRTH





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MOST NEWBORN DEATHS OCCUR IN JUST 10 COUNTRIES



Nearly two-thirds of all newborn deaths (2 million out of 3 million each year) occur in just 10 countries. Many of these countries have very large populations (such as China and Indonesia) and others have high percentages of newborns dying (Afghanistan, DR Congo, Ethiopia and Tanzania). Several have both large populations and high newborn mortality rates (Bangladesh, India, Nigeria and Pakistan). These are places where mothers are also at high risk of death during pregnancy and childbirth – 59 percent of maternal deaths occur in these same 10 countries.

By 2015, the lives of 3.6 million women and newborn could be saved by a skilled, competent midwife, supported by functional services –

averting two thirds of maternal and newborn deaths.

- Invest. Increase financial and in-kind investments in midwives, the midwifery workforce and midwifery services in order to accelerate progress towards the MDGs and the post 2015 development agenda on health and to expand universal access to reproductive health, including family planning
- Educate. Invest in competency-based, high quality, technologically innovative education programs and infrastructure that result in fully skilled and competent midwives
- Deploy in the right places. Ensure that midwives are effectively recruited, deployed, and supported to work in the communities that need them most
- Be woman centred. Work with care providers, women and communities to promote and provide sensitive, respectful, womencentred care in communities and facilities
- Regulate. Ensure regulation and licensing so that midwives are authorized and supported to provide the full range of evidence-based maternal and newborn health services that they are skilled and competent to deliver
- Support. Support midwives' associations, nurses and midwives associations and other organizations at the national, regional and international levels that advocate for and strengthen midwifery services and practice
- Improve the evidence. Enhance data collection and the evidence-base for midwifery and identify actions to address the context-specific barriers to midwifery services within countries

Since 2010, 46 lower income countries have pledged to increase coverage of midwifery services and one in three focus on midwives as part of their commitments to the UN Secretary-General's Global Strategy for Women's and Children's Health and the *Every Woman Every Child* movement. Significant progress has been made toward meeting MDG 4 and 5, and 6 but sustained momentum is required to end preventable deaths of women and their newborn.















The Midwife Effect

I found – and it was not a finding I had expected – that wherever (there was) a system of maternal care . . . based on trained . . . and respected midwives . . . maternal mortality was at its lowest.

I cannot think of an exception to that rule. (Loudon 1992)





The Midwife Effect

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Midwives can prevent up to 60% of maternal deaths when they are educated, competent and authorized to practice to the full scope – during pregnancy, childbirth and the post-partum period – identify and immediately manage complications in pregnancy and make suitable and timely referrals. (UNFPA)

Midwives are an investment in the health of mothers, their newborn, the community and a nation (Helen de Pinho)
